WHAT PLANT AM I?

Do you have a spot in your garden or yard that stays moist and is shady? Then think about planting me. I even tolerate shallow standing water. I can prevent the erosion of pond banks and the banks of streams. My bold-textured fronds, which can exceed 3 feet, are upright and arching and are of slow to moderate growth. I am deciduous and native to the eastern half of North America. My name comes either from a Celtic god or a Scandinavian writer.

My fronds can be male or female. If female, a rust-colored frond produces sporangia, which contain spores. I can be propagated by these spores, or by rhizome division. I'm cold hardy.

My bristly crown of rootstock is the source for a fibrous potting medium for orchids and other epiphytes.

Do you know what plant I am?

How to prune your Hydrangeas

EVERYBODY'S FAVE SUMMER GARDEN FLOWERS WITH THE HUGE FLOWER HEADS ARE THE HYDRANGEA SHRUB. BUT IF YOU PRUNE INCORRECTLY OR AT THE WRONG TIME, YOU MAY DESTROY THE CHANCE OF FUTURE BLOOMS.

IT ALL COMES DOWN TO WHICH TYPE OF HYDRANGEA YOU HAVE, ACCORDING TO STEPHEN ORR OF "THE DIRT" VIDEO SERIES, AND SHERYL GEERTS IN A FEBRUARY 2020 ARTICLE, BOTH FOR BETTER HOMES AND GARDENS MAGAZINE.

ORR SAYS WE ALL HAVE A TENDENCY TO OVER PRUNE SHRUBS, AND WE MAY NOT HAVE TO PRUNE AT ALL. BUT IF THE STEMS GET A LITTLE TALL AND FLOPPY, MAYBE SNIP AWAY A LITTLE THEN. BUT MORE IMPORTANTLY IS KNOWING THE TIME OF YEAR TO DO IT, AND THAT DEPENDS ON WHAT TYPE OF HYDRANGEA YOU HAVE. (THERE ARE MORE THAN TWO TYPES BUT THE AUTHORS KEPT IT SIMPLE.)

HYDRANGEA *MACROPHYLLA* OR "BIG LEAF" TYPES WITH GREEN STEMS NEED TO BE PRUNED AFTER THEY STOP BLOOMING;

HYDRANGEA *PANICULATA* HAS A WOODY STEM AND NEEDS TO BE PRUNED IN EARLY SPRING. AS FOR PLANTING, ORR'S HINT #1: THAT CAN BE SPRING, SUMMER OR FALL BUT PLANT TO THE DEPTH OF THE POT THEY COME IN AND CHECK THE HANGTAG FOR SPACING. FOR EXAMPLE, OAKLEAF HYDRANGEAS GET REALLY HUGE, BUT THEN A DWARF DOESN'T TAKE UP MUCH ROOM AT ALL.

HINT #2-WATER! HYDRANGEA, THE WORD 'WATER' IS IN ITS NAME. SO, DO IT-GIVE PLENTY. IF THEY DO GO WITHOUT WATERING AND THE FLOWERHEADS TURN BROWN, GO AHEAD, AND KEEP THEM WATERED, BUT THERE ISN'T MUCH YOU CAN DO EXCEPT CUT THE FLOWERS OFF TO THE FIRST GREEN LEAF. YOUR PLANT WILL NOT BE MUCH GOOD FOR THE REST OF THIS YEAR, BUT IT SHOULD BOUNCE BACK THE NEXT.

GEERTS IN HER ARTICLE AGREES THAT IT IS CONFUSING BECAUSE THE DIFFERENT HYDRAN-GEA TYPES DO REQUIRE DIFFERENT PRUNING METHODS, YET SHE BELIEVES THAT PRUNING CAN HELP TO KEEP YOUR PLANTS HEALTHY AND ACHIEVE THE SHAPE YOU WOULD LIKE. HER TIP?- SHE ADVISES IT IS BEST NOT TO REMOVE MORE THAN ONE THIRD OF THE HYDRAN-GEA PLANT AT ANY ONE TIME WHEN IT IS ACTIVELY GROWING.

SO, WHICH ONE DO YOU HAVE?

The Endless Summer ${f R}$ hydrangea is an oakleaf macrophylla- you know the kind that turn blue if in acid soil, and pink in alkaline. After blooming and the flow-



ERS HAVE FADED, GEERTS ADVISES TRIMMING WITH SHARP, CLEAN PRUNERS TO THE LEAF SET, USUALLY SOMETIME LATER IN SUMMER. THEN THE SHRUB WILL HAVE A CHANCE TO PRODUCE NEW GROWTH WHERE NEXT YEAR'S BUDS WILL FORM.

FOR PANICULATAS LIKE 'LIMELIGHT', IF YOU WANT LOTS OF FRESH NEW GROWTH AND FLOWERS LATER THAT YEAR, OR TO BUSH OUT A SPINDLY PLANT, CUT TO ABOUT A FOOT ABOVE GROUND IN EARLY SPRING BUT AVOID DOING SO WHEN FLOWER BUDS ARE OPENING.

BEAUTYBERRY/CATNIP INSECT REPELLENT DR. MARY ANN ARMBRUSTER

FILL A POT WITH BEAUTYBERRY LEAVES AND COVER WITH WATER. BRING TO A BOIL, LOWER HEAT, AND SIMMER FOR APPROXIMATELY ONE HOUR. STRAIN AND DISCARD LEAVES-ADD TO YOUR COMPOST! ALLOW LIQUID TO COOL.

REPEAT THE PROCESS USING CATNIP. THEN, YOU SHOULD MIX TOGETHER ABOUT THE SAME VOLUME OF LIQUID FOR BOTH. ITS USABLE BUT YOU MAY WANT TO ADD THE ESSENTIAL OIL OF YOUR CHOICE FROM THIS LIST:

PASSIFLORA INCAMATA



Passiflora incarnata, known as maypop, purple passionflower, true passionflower, wild apricot, and wild passion vine, is a fast-growing perennial vine with climbing or trailing stems. A member of the passionflower genus Passiflora, the purple passionflower has large, intricate flowers with prominent styles and stamens.

I have this planted in a butterfly garden at my fishing camp in the basin, and the Gulf Coast Fritillary Butterflies are busy laying eggs while their caterpillars are busy munching leaves! I have pretty good-sized brood this year, and usually have half a dozen butterflies





hovering around. I also have passiflora alba the white passionflower in the garden. Both varieties attract butter-flies, but they like the purple one the best.
