WHAT PLANT AM I?

This is a very hard "What Plant?" column to write. I have a very large live oak tree in my side yard which is probably 70 to 100 years old. Two large branches were over and onto our shed and were hitting the electric wires. As I looked up at the tree, I noticed a thinning of the branches and browning of the leaves. There were rust-colored streaks on the trunk and a shelf fungus (conk) coming out of the base of the trunk. I took pictures of the tree and of the fungus and sent them to Dan. He forwarded them to Dr. Raj, who confirmed what Dan had diagnosed. My beautiful old oak has Ganoderma, a fungus that reproduces by spores. There is nothing that can be done to save it. The only thing I can do is assess the danger of the tree coming down in a storm. The fungus rots the root system that anchors the tree into the ground. Until a month ago, the tree appeared healthy.

There is another, a younger tree, about fifty feet away. Dan says that if the roots graft, the fungus may be transferred to the second tree.

My family and I have enjoyed the shade from this tree for fifty years. I feel as if an old friend has died.

IN OCTOBER, THE MASTER GARDENER'S CLASS OF 2019 'WENT WALK-ABOUT' TO THE UL LAFAYETTE RESEARCH FARM AT CADE IN ST. MARTIN PARISH.

THEIR 600 ACRES INCLUDES CATTLE PASTURES, SUGAR CANE FIELDS, CRAWFISH PONDS AND A WELCOME CENTER WITH CLASSROOM FACILITIES IN THE REMODELED OLD DAIRY.

IN THAT CENTER RESIDES THE HOME OF THE ONLY SEED BANK IN LOUISIANA AND THE LOUISIANA WILDFLOWER PROJECT. MARK SIMON, THE RETIRED MANAGER, LEC-TURED ON THAT SET UP WHICH IS QUITE EX-TENSIVE DUE TO A \$1.7 MILLION GRANT FROM THE LOUISIANA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION AND DEVELOPMENT (LADOTD), THE PROJECT PROVIDES SEEDS FOR FLOWERS PLANTED ALONG LOUISIANA HIGHWAYS. WE WERE SHOWN ROOMS WITH **EQUIPMENT WHICH RANGED FROM SEED** SEPARATORS, TO GERMINATION AREAS AND TEMPERATURE-CONTROLLED STORAGE. THERE WAS A SEPARATE SEED BANK AND COTTON GIN FOR PROCESSING THE HISTORI-CAL ACADIAN BROWN COTTON. NOW EN-DANGERED, FARMERS ARE ENCOURAGED TO PLANT ACADIAN BROWN COTTON! AT ONE TIME THIS SOFT, TAN-COLORED COT-TON WAS HAND-WOVEN INTO BLANKETS BY THE ORIGINAL ACADIAN SETTLERS. (FACEBOOK/ACADIAN BROWN COTTON)

IN A SEPARATE TALK ON BEES, MR. SIMON, AN AVID BEEKEEPER, INFORMED US THAT THEY TOO ARE IN TROUBLE DUE TO DECLINE OF HABITAT, AS WELL AS OVER-SPRAYING OF PESTICIDES, WHICH GOES FOR FARMERS AS WELL AS BACKYARD AMATEUR GARDENERS. HE ALSO SUGGESTED THAT BEE KEEPERS REGISTER THEIR HIVES SO THAT MOSQUITO AND PEST CONTROL COMPANIES THEN LOCATE THOSE HIVES WITH GPS AND POSSIBLY AVOID CONTAMINATING THEM. HE ADDED THAT IT WAS INEXPENSIVE AND EASY TO REGISTER. (WWW.LABEEKEEPERS.ORG)
