USING HERBICIDES AROUND THE YARD

A beautiful lawn can be a landscape statement in itself. That is why so many homeowners fertilize and spray their lawns with insecticides, fungicides and herbicides. I want to focus on the use of herbicides in lawns and the problems that can occur from not using them properly.

Always read and follow the label; it is the law! Some of the newer herbicides like MSM Turf only require ¼ teaspoon per gallon of water. If you use even just a tad bit more, you can cause slight damage to your lawn grasses as well as trees and shrubs in the landscape.

Perhaps the biggest problem arises from applying herbicides with a sprayer. Applying an herbicide during windy conditions causes it to drift. Off target plants can easily be damaged by herbicide drift. Once the drifted herbicide lands on tomato plants, the leaves curl and the plants cease to make flowers that form fruit. My office has been getting a lot of calls about herbicide drift, As Master Gardeners, we need to educate the public and make sure that homeowners know of the potential damage that can occur from mis-application.

WHAT PLANT AM I?

I am a perennial herb and the only species in my genus. I'm native to the northern and southern Eastern states.

I grow one to two feet in height. I have narrow green leaves which arch downward toward the ground and often am the first to appear in the spring. A sticky substance coats my leaves, which causes them to glisten. In woods, meadows, and open fields, part sun to part shade, and most soil conditions, I thrive. I do best with one to two hours of full sun and tolerate seasonal flooding.

From May to July, I send a stalk up to 5 feet high with stunning white flower clusters at the top. These flowers resemble common hyacinths. After pollination (usually by beetles), my flowers turn green. All parts of me are poisonous, but especially my bulbs. Native Americans crushed my bulbs and mixed them with honey to create a potion that would trap and kill flies. Children and small animals are most susceptible to this poison, but large animals such as cattle and sheep can suffer respiratory distress after eating me. Oddly enough, some butterflies drink my nectar with no ill effects.

Propagate me by dividing my bulbs.

The event is open to the public for free admission.



The 2019 Master Gardener Class is starting up in August, consider volunteering your time as a MG Class Mentor.

RECORDING (AND CORRECTING) YOUR CONTINUING EDUCATION AND VOLUNTEER HOURS

Continuing Education hours are earned by viewing presentations or videos, reading horticultural material, attending Garden Talks, Plant Swaps, Library Lectures, General Meetings with an educational speaker, or other approved CE events. Members need to meet the annual requirement of 6 hours of CE to remain active. Master Gardeners in Training do not have to record CE their first year. CE hours are recorded under "Continuing Education" in the LMG Service Hours Report pull down menu.

When you sign in to the LSU AgCenter website to record hours, click "Add New Hours".

Under the "Type of Service" pull down menu you will see two options: "Volunteer Service" and "Continuing Education". Opt for "Continuing Education" when recording your CE hours.

The category "Continuing Education" under the Volunteer Service "Activity" pull down menu is for recording hours spent presenting or preparing material to be presented to the community or LPMGA members.

Hours recorded in this category do not count toward your 6 CE hours

If you feel that you have recorded your CE or any other hours incorrectly, don't worry, correcting this is simple.

After you sign in to record your hours, click "Edit/View Hours" in the left column of the LMG Service Hours Report. This will show a list of all your recorded CE and Volunteer Service Hours.

Under your Volunteer Service Hours find the item that you want to change-Check the "Activity" column for the words "Continuing Education" (or other category you need to change) and check that the date matches the entry you want to change.

Click "View/Edit Details" on the left of that entry.

You can now change the Type of Service, the Activity category, your description or any of the other details that you had recorded. In the case of changing hours to Continuing Education, click the Type of Service menu and opt for Continuing Education.

Check that all your other details are correct and click SAVE.

Changes to your hours can only be made during the current year. You cannot go back and edit or add hours in previous years.
