WHAT PLANT AM I?

I am a deciduous perennial shrub native to Japan, Korea, and China. Before my small green leaves appear, I produce dense clusters of pure white flowers on arching branches in early spring. My growth is upright and clumping, anywhere from 4 feet to 8 feet tall, and as wide. I grow and flower best in full sun to part shade in almost any soil in Zones 4 to 10. I attract bees, butterflies, and hummingbirds.

Prune me after I bloom because I flower on last year's growth. Deadheading may produce a second flowering. Propagate me by taking softwood cuttings in late spring or early summer, or hardwood cuttings of dormant leafless growth in late fall or early winter. To prepare me for winter, water me heavily so that my roots begin dormancy with a good water supply. Spread a 3 inch layer of mulch, keeping it 4 to 6 inches from my stems. Prune out dead wood. In January or February, spray me with a dormant spray of horticultural oil with copper or sulfur, which are fungicides. Cover me completely with this mixture.

In the South, I am frequently planted interspersed with azaleas. I can often be seen on the Azalea Trail.

THE DEVENPORT REPORT:

Winterizing Fertilizer Use On St. Augustine Grass

Horticulture Agents generally recommend fertilizing summer lawn grasses beginning in April and ending in August. The use of nitrogen fertilizers before and after these dates often leads to the development of a lawn disease called "Brown Patch" or "Large Patch" in St. Augustine lawns. In late summer of 2020, there was an explosion of Tropical Sod Webworms in the state that nearly rivals the one we saw in 2016. Many homeowners that experienced that invasion soon found out how difficult it was to get the webworms under control. Several applications of either granular or liquid

insecticides over several months were needed to help reduce the damage caused by these worms.

Sod webworms have chewing mouthparts and damage can be seen by observing the leaf blades of your St. Augustine grass in the damaged areas of your lawn. Once the leaf blades are chewed by these worms, the soil gets exposed to more sunlight and you often get an increase in weed production in your lawn. Typically, lawns that are attacked by sod webworms do recover on their own! One way of trying to get your lawn grass to grow back and fill in in the month of September is to apply a winterizing fertilizer. When selecting a winterizer, you should only use one that contains 10% Nitrogen or lower and has Potassium levels of at least 10%. This lower percentage of Nitrogen will allow your St. Augustine to slowly recover without causing a huge outbreak of Brown Patch and help reduce the possibility of cold temperature injury from an early hard freeze. Potassium is really the winterizing ingredient in a winterizing fertilizer. Some area soils already have a high level of potassium and using a winterizer may not even be needed. Perhaps the best thing a homeowner can do is to take a soil sample of their lawns to see what the analysis is regarding potassium and other minerals.

Some of the winterizers in stores have 32% Nitrogen and that is way too high to be applying to St. Augustine. This formulation works on northern grasses like Fescues but again, it should not be used on your St. Augustine lawns. You should also be aware that some of the Weed and Feed fertilizers can carry around 29% Nitrogen that if applied in the cooler times of the growing season it can also lead to an outbreak of Brown Patch in your lawns. Therefore, if you do not want to begin a regimen of applying lawn fungicides, you may want to look at the label on the bag of fertilizer and make sure it does not contain high nitrogen levels.

Every bag of fertilizer sold has an analysis written on the front or back of the container. Typically, there are three slots for the fertilizer levels in the bag and is depicted in percentages of N-P-K which stands for Nitrogen-Phosphorus-Potassium. So, make sure you read the label on the bag of winterizer fertilizer or any other fertilizer you plan on using in September make sure the nitrogen level is 10% or lower to help avoid fungal development in your St. Augustine lawns.

THESE POTTED PLANTS DO WELL IN A SUNNY LOCATION AND SINCE THEY ARE TROPICAL, BRING THEM IN FOR FREEZING TEMPERATURES IF YOU WANT TO KEEP THEM YEAR AFTER YEAR.

HEATHER KIRK-BALLARD ALSO OF THE LSU AGCENTER IN HER VIDEO DISCUSSED CHRYSANTHEMUMS AKA MUMS. GARDEN MUMS ARE THOSE DOME-SHAPED, POTTED PLANTS IN MANY VIBRANT COLORS THAT MAKE GREAT DECORATIONS; THESE ARE NOT THE LONG-STEMMED CUT FLOWERS. TRY NOT TO SELECT THE MUM THAT HAS FULLY BLOOMED, SO THEY HAVE A LONGER DISPLAY TIME. DEADHEAD THE SPENT BLOOMS, AND WATER FROM BELOW TO REDUCE THE CHANCE OF ROT.

NOVEMBER 1 IS ALL SAINTS' DAY, AND IN SOUTH LOUISIANA TO HONOR DEPARTED LOVED ONES, MUMS AND CANDLES ARE OFTENTIMES USED TO DECORATE GRAVE SITES, SO THE NURSERIES GROW QUITE A FEW.

IN "HORTICULTURE HINTS" FROM LSU AG, FALL 2020-SOUTHWEST THERE IS AN ARTICLE ON ORNAMENTAL GRASSES. FALL CAN BE DRY IN OUR AREA AND THESE ARE GREAT DROUGHT-TOLERANT PLANTS THAT ARE BLOOMING NOW IN OFTEN BIG LONG SPIKES. EXAMPLES ARE PINK MUHLY, ZEBRA, PAMPAS AND FIREWORKS FOUNTAIN GRASSES.

"BETTER HOMES AND GARDENS" AND "MARTHA STEWART LIVING", HAVE SOME GREAT IDEAS IN THEIR NOV 2020 ISSUES.

Dried flowers, either DIY or store-bought are experiencing a 70's comeback and bark-covered florist vine or grapevine wreaths can be used to mount hot-glued dried flowers. You can dry some naturally, or silica gel powder from the crafts store preserves petal shape and color.
