

How Has the Freeze Affected Our Plants

President, MaryAnn Armbruster's message:

Well, I think winter is finally over and it's finally Spring in Acadiana. I am planting as though it is anyway. Things are getting busy, but I still have to find time to get my hands in the dirt. It's just not Spring otherwise. Even though it's early according to the Average Last Frost Date, I have set out a few tomatoes. Of course I also have seedlings waiting in the wings in case we get a late frost. If we don't get a late frost perhaps I will have that perfect, beautiful, red or yellow, or orange, or black tomato earlier than anyone else.

Please remember not to prune your frost-damaged plants too soon. Most of mine seem to be coming back fine, but it is possible that they could come back as late as July. So if the plant is of any value to you, give it a serious chance before giving up on it.

Our next meeting is on Wednesday, March 7th at 6:00 p.m. Please remember that this meeting will be held at LEDA, not the Main Library. Our speaker will be Stuart Gauthier talking about freeze recovery for our plants, and Juan (our VP) will speak about roses at our March 10 Garden Talk at All Seasons Nursery. THE DEVENPORT REPORT



When spring is in the air, many of us are thinking about sprucing up our yards and perhaps doing some landscaping, yard maintenance or even tree work, trying to get our homes looking good for the season. If you are able to do this work on your own, you can enjoy the satisfaction of doing the improvements yourself and enjoy the savings that go along with that. For many, you choose to hire someone to do the chores that either you cannot physically perform on your own or maybe you do not care for yardwork and rather pay someone to do those jobs instead. There is the possibility that you are not skilled enough to design a landscape plan or know enough about plant selection or plant requirements and need the help of someone that does. The same goes for tree work, irrigation installation and pruning shrubbery in your existing landscape.

It is important for you to know that the person you hire to do these tasks is required by law to be licensed by the Louisiana Horticulture Commission. This government agency that falls under the jurisdiction of the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry regulates the plant industry in many areas including Landscape-Horticulturist, Arborist, Irrigation Contractor, and Landscape Architecture. The link: http://www.Ldaf.state.La.us/Ldaf-programs/horticulture-programs/louisiana-horticulture-commission will provide the names of license holders in your area. Persons holding licenses are required to pass a test! In addition, arborists are required to carry a certain amount of liability insurance before they can work in your yard. All licensees are required to display their license numbers on their work vehicles so you will know that they are legally capable of working in the state.

Sometimes the costs of landscape improvements can go into the thousands of dollars. If you hire an unlicensed person to perform these jobs, the costs of inferior workmanship may be higher than you could imagine. The next time you hire someone to do work in your yard, make sure they are properly licensed. It is the law! Help spread the word to anyone you know that is planning to have work done in their yard. Many people do not know about this licensing requirement.

What Plant is this?

I am an herbaceous, carnivorous perennial mostly found in heavy acetic, peaty bogs and flatwoods. Normally found in large colonies in full sun to partial shade, I grow best in Zones 8 to 9. I was once more abundant, but as land was cleared for agriculture and development, my range has been reduced greatly. My growth is upright, with long tapering funnel-shaped or tubular leaves. My veins are dark purple, with white between them and on my lid covering. Because I grow in poor soil, I trap insects which provide amino acids, iron, proteins and other micronutrients. Digestive fluids in my funnels release these necessary nutrients, and downward pointing bristles keep the insects from escaping.

My flowers bloom in spring and are inverted, nearly round, with fiddle-shaped pink to purple petals, carried on long slender stems. In the fall, my fruit, which is a capsule, matures. It has no ornamental value. I should never be removed from the wild, but now specimens can be purchased that were produced by tissue culture and hybridization. Grow me in low, wet sites and in bog gardens. I can also be propagated by seed and by division of creeping underground stems. In containers, mix 1/2 peat and 1/2 sand, but there is a low success rate for this method.

Dear Master Gardeners:



How did the Four O'Clock look in 1640? Surely this seems like an odd question. The oddity compounds when one asks why is this in the Master Gardener Newsletter, for heaven sake!

As semantics become clarified, this relates to Eastern Indian art brought to America by way of the Edwin Binney III family – that of the Cayola fortune. Thousands of handcrafted paintings were given over the centuries to show favor to leaders. These were so often accepted with thanks and stored in drawers never to be seen again. That was the case until these came to light and Edwin Binney purchased massive numbers for some unit price comparable to 25 cents, beginning in 1958.

Among the many I had the chance to view (magnifying glass in hand, drawer after drawer), I came upon this in San Diego's Balboa Museum collection that caught my attention. Most were images of deities, some men, women and animals but this was the only one among what I viewed that was a specific flower: that being the four o'clock or the Marvel of Peru flower as common names. The museum provided its Latin name, too:

Mirabilis jalepena. So lovely, I wanted to share with our Master Gardeners.
